# Medical examiner system begins for county

### New morgue being built; overdose deaths cited

Winnebago County has officially switched from an elected coroner to a hired medical examiner as of the first of the year and the Medical Examiner's Office plans to break ground on a new morgue this spring.

Coroners and medical examiners investigate all reportable deaths that occur within the county. The office works with law enforcement and the District Attorney's office in death investigations and may testify in court.

The move from an elected to a hired position comes after former Winnebago County coroner Barry Busby was censured by the County Board and resigned in 2019 amid allegations that included sexual ha-

rassment, retaliation and absenteeism. Busby spent months in Florida while holding the position, which paid \$73,000 per year.

A month after Busby turned in his resignation letter, the county board voted to eliminate the elected coroner's position and replace it with a hired medical examiner position. The change couldn't occur until Busby's term was complete at the end of 2022.

After Busby's resignation, Gov. Tony Evers appointed Cheryl Brehmer to the vacant coroner's position for the remainder of the term.

The county has now moved forward on plans to eliminate and replace the coroner's position. As of Jan. 1, the Coroner's Office is now the Medical Examiner's Office. County Executive Jon Doemel appointed Brehmer as the lead medical examiner.

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# County board approves social media standards

The Winnebago County Board of Supervisors approved a social media policy for county employees at a meeting Tuesday, although the policy won't apply to supervisors themselves because they're elected officials.

Emergency Management director Eric Rasmussen said the county social media accounts are used to share information and promote one-way communication. The various county departments have several social media accounts on several platforms.

"This is something that we're actively using to educate the members of our community," he said.

The county has been using social media for more than a decade without any standard countywide guidance in place. Over the past six months the county social media pages have seen about 2,500 updates, posts and comments per month, which jumped to more than 4,000 in November.

The new policy establishes which county employees are authorized to post on the social media accounts. Each department head will be responsible for content posted on the department social media pages.

The Information Technology Department will maintain a list of social media profiles approved for use by the county and each department head will maintain a list of employees who are authorized to communicate the county's business on the page.

The new policy does not allow county employees to comment, respond to comments or "like" comments or posts except under limited circumstances. Employees are not permitted to remove public comments or block the public from viewing or commenting on county social media accounts. If a public comment incites unlawful behavior, county employees may notify law enforcement.

The county will also retain records of all social media posts and comments for seven years, in accordance with open records laws. County employees who violate the social media policy may face disciplinary action including termination.

Employees authorized to use county social media accounts must conduct themselves professionally and in accordance with all policies, directives and professional expectations. The county's website content and social media posts will be subject to approval by department heads.

The policy does not apply to a county employee's personal use of social media unless the employee is using their account as a representative of the county. The policy notes that the public may attribute an employee's private social media page to the county.

"For these reasons, employees must exercise care when posting and commenting on social media, as personal views can be tied back to employment with (the) county," according to the policy.

Rasmussen said the majority of adults in the United States are using social media to read news and find information.

"It is a priority of the county to increase our outward communication and transparency," he said. "We want to make sure this communication is happening in a professional and legal manner."

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# Advisory vote on cannabis gets more county discussion

There's still a slim chance that Winnebago County residents may be able to weigh in on the legalization of marijuana in the April 4 spring election.

This is after the County Board of Supervisors sent the resolution for a cannabis advisory referendum back to the Judiciary and Legislative committees at its December meeting, limiting the possibility of the advisory making it on the April ballot before the Jan. 24 deadline.

The cannabis advisory referendum request was brought by supervisors Michael Norton, Brian Defferding, Steven Binder, Julie Gordon, Doug Zellmer and Rachael Dowling.

The referendum question would ask residents whether cannabis should:

- (a) Be legal for recreational use for adults 21 years of age and older, and legal for medical use, taxed and regulated similar to alcohol.
  - (b) Be legal for medical purposes only.
- (c) Remain a criminally illegal drug as provided under current law.
- (d) None of the above.

Attorney and former municipal judge Len Kachinski, of Fox Crossing, said the referendum is a political move to gain support for marijuana legalization.

"I have had so many clients, dozens ... whose lives have been destroyed by the use of marijuana," he said. "It zaps ambition, it causes all the problems that the previous speakers have talked about and it's just generally very negative for society."

Supervisors Nate Gustafson and Conley

Hanson proposed sending the county advisory referendum request back to the committees, which some supervisors said was to kill the measure and not give people the opportunity to weigh in on legalization. The board voted in favor of sending the measure to the committees.

Earlier this year the Winnebago County District Attorney's office issued a memo stating that the county has ceased criminal prosecution of personal use marijuana cases. The DA's office requested that personal use marijuana cases be handled as ordinance violations or sent to an alternative program.

Twenty-one states have legalized marijuana for recreational use, including bordering states Michigan and Illinois. It remains illegal in Wisconsin for medical or recreational

In September, Gov. Tony Evers announced he would include marijuana legalization and decriminalization in the upcoming 2023 state budget.

Assembly Speaker Robin Vos told Wis-Politics last month that putting recreational marijuana in the budget would be a waste of time and would scare people into thinking that approving medical marijuana is a gateway to legalizing recreational marijuana.

Norton said he is working to move the county cannabis advisory referendum measure through the committees. The referendum request would need to pass the Judiciary and Public Safety Committee, which each have meetings scheduled Monday, and then also be approved at a county board meeting before the Jan. 24 deadline, to be on the April ballot.



### Fire truck hit on 41

A portion of Interstate 41 south of Breezewood Lane was briefly shut down Saturday night as a Neenah-Menasha Fire Rescue crew responded to a vehicle incident during slippery conditions. During the call one of its fire trucks was struck by another vehicle. No firefighters were hurt. Officials reminded drivers to slow down in the presence of emergency vehicles.

### Winter Festival planned with weather in mind

Washington Park's annual Winter Festival is planned for Jan. 14 with a variety of outdoor family activities depending on how weather conditions cooperate with the plans.

The two-hour event from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. hopes to offer skating, hockey contests, sledding and other contests if the Parks Department is able to get the conditions needed to form a skating rink. Superintendent of recreation Jim Kluge said earlier this week that they may not have the ice option by that time but are still planning for the event with other activities for children and families based on the

He also said there would be consideration for postponing the event for at least a week if better weather conditions were forecast in the near future.

"If we get some cold weather we can get (a rink) up in a couple of days or so. They will work overnight laying water down but the temperatures have to be there," Kluge said. "We're hopeful and crossing our fingers."

Fox Communities Credit Union has been a sponsor of the annual festival and provides s'mores, hot dogs, hot chocolate and other give-a-ways using the warming shelter as a staging area.

The festival came about when Washington Park and the ice skating area were reconfigured about five years ago and reintroduced to park visitors.


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# High-speed chase through region awaits charges

More than a month after two men stole a vehicle in Menasha, fled from authorities during a high-speed chase and jumped into a river before being apprehended, police say the incident is still under investigation.

A 19-year-old Eau Claire man, who was driving, and his passenger, a 25-year-old Neenah man, allegedly stole a 2023 Land Rover Defender vehicle from Menasha on Nov. 29. The vehicle may also have been involved in other crimes in the area, according to a Fond du Lac police press release.

The men were involved in a vehicle pursuit in the Menasha area and eluded law enforcement officers. The vehicle was last seen heading south on Interstate 41 in Winnebago County.

Fond du Lac police located the stolen vehicle traveling near I-41 and South Military Road and attempted a traffic stop. The vehicle failed to pull over and fled, with officers in pursuit. The chase reached speeds of about 90 miles per hour while the vehicle was traveling into Fond du Lac.

The stolen vehicle continued into town and struck an occupied vehicle on Western Avenue. Both suspects exited the vehicle and fled on foot. The occupants of the struck vehicle were unharmed.

Authorities from several agencies responded to the area to search for the men and a drone and police canine were de-

ployed. Both men jumped into the Fond du Lac River to attempt to get away from law enforcement officers before being taken into custody.

The Eau Claire man was arrested on charges of operating a motor vehicle without the owner's consent, resisting and eluding an officer and a probation hold.

The Neenah man was arrested on

charges of resisting an officer, possession of a schedule two narcotic, possession of an illegally obtained prescription and a probation hold.

Menasha Police community liaison Dan Hoernke said the vehicle theft and other crimes are still under active investigation and he declined to release the names of the two men involved.

### Utility shares tips to stay safe and warm

Wisconsin Public Service offers these winter tips to stay safe and warm.

Space heater safety: Only use newer models with safety features like automatic shutoff. Keep it at least 6 feet away from flammable materials like drapes or blankets. Plug heaters directly into the wall, not into extension cords or power strips. Place the heater on a flat surface away from children and pets.

Safe sleeping: Turn off electric blankets when they are not being used. Keep pets away from electric blankets, as their teeth and claws can puncture wire insulation and cause damage.

Prevent carbon monoxide dangers: Make sure carbon monoxide detectors are working properly and learn the symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning.

Oven safety: Never use a stove or oven

to heat your home. Not only is it inefficient, but it could also lead to carbon monoxide poisoning.

Let the sun in: Open curtains or blinds when the sun is out to help warm your home. Close them at night to help retain heat and cut down on drafts.

Be prepared: Assemble an emergency kit with blankets, flashlights and battery-powered chargers for your cellphones.

Keep meters clear: Safely brush away snow and ice from your home's natural gas meter and vents. The extra weight can stress or crack meter piping, causing a natural gas leak. It also can clog appliance vents, trapping carbon monoxide indoors.

of this time. As of now it appears the worst ice is right next to shore where it is thinner from low water levels and ice shoving onto shore. I recommend

about the ice conditions check the ice thickness yourself and remember that the ice is never 100% safe.







Brehmer's tenure has seen a sharp increase in overdose deaths in the county. In 2022, there were 31 confirmed overdose deaths and seven more possible overdose deaths, which are pending toxicology results. Forty-one people fatally overdosed in the county in 2021. The majority of the deaths are attributed to fentanyl.

"We've seen it go to heroin, to heroin and fentanyl, then it was meth and fentanyl – they just keep coming," Brehmer said at a June county board meeting.

The county Health Department, Human Services Department, Medical Examiner's Office and Overdose Fatality Review Team have partnered to provide additional services for families who have experienced the loss of a loved one due to an overdose. Starting in February, a threeyear pilot bereavement program will be operated out of the Medical Examiner's Office for family and friends.

Suspicious deaths require autopsies, which are conducted in Fond du Lac County. Fond du Lac no longer has the capacity to store bodies, which means Winnebago is often holding them for up to 12 days.

The county borrowed a cold storage trailer from another county that it had been using to store bodies. The trailer was only a temporary solution and experienced issues including a cooling system failure. Brehmer said the county returned the trailer and the livery service that transports the bodies is providing temporary storage of the deceased.

In June, the board approved a \$1.5 million proposal to expand the sheriff's department's evidence storage and add a morgue with cold storage so that the county will store its own bodies. The Medical Examiner's Office will also be added on to the morgue.

Brehmer said the project is expected to go out to bid this month. The plan is to break ground on the new morgue this

The Buy Nothing Project was started in 2013 in Washington by friends Rebecca Rockefeller and Liesl Clark, who touted it as a local gift economy that is parallel to worldwide cash economies. It has since grown to include 7,000 groups in 44 nations with more than 6 million members.

There are about 71 Buy Nothing groups in Wisconsin, includeingnearby communities Fox Crossing, Appleton, Greenville, Grand Chute and Oshkosh. The local pages are run entirely by volunteers, with support and guidance from the organiza-

The Neenah group was started by friends Miss Smedema and Jonna Smith in 2020 and has nearly 1,000 members.

Smedema knows all about clutter. As the owner of the business Miss Assist in Neenah,

she often helps people clean and declutter their homes.

"It's hard to let go of things, especially when it's something that's really held a lot of meaning for you or you see it as something of value," she said. "And when we have that connection of it going to somebody who truly needs it, who truly wants it, and you can really make that personal connection, it's a little bit easier to let those things go."

That's where the Buy Nothing Project comes in. She compared it to the oldschool concept of borrowing a cup of sugar from a neighbor.

"We just don't have that anymore because of the world we live in (and) technology, there's somewhat of a disconnect, so that we don't know our neighbors," she said. "We have a unique opportunity in our area to help serve one another."

Smedema, whose boyfriend is a volunteer firefighter from Mountain, said the group helped her out in a pinch when she was invited to hand out Halloween candy

three fireballs to go with it," she said. Her experience was so positive that she joined the fire department.

Group member Kristi Clover said she posted in the group searching for a volunteer to be a Girl Scout cookie manager so that a child could sell cookies. Within a few hours she found four volunteers.

During the height of the pandemic, Clover said members dropped off essentials, such as toilet paper and food, to other members who were home sick with COVID-19.

In 2021, group members collected gifts and delivered them to 34 residents at an assisted living facility on Christmas Day, while dressed as elves.

In 2022, Clover collected gift cards from members to donate to a local mother who was struggling to afford Christmas gifts for her child.

"Being a part of a giving community is such a gift in itself," she said, noting that she hopes more local Buy Nothing groups are started, such as Menasha.

Rachel Gellerstedt is a group moderator who saw membership triple over the past two years. The night before she was having a wine tasting at her house she realized she was short on glasses. A group member loaned her eight wine glasses to use for the

"My favorite part, though, is that I've been able to declutter my house and give it to people who truly want or need it, instead of throwing it away or going through the hassle of selling," she said. "I often wonder how many pounds of trash our group saves from the landfill, because we are now more apt to donate instead of throwing it away."

The items aren't necessarily gifted to the first person who responds to a post. Although there is no requirement, members often post the free item along with a question, which encourages group members to share and connect in the comments.

Group member Beth Oosterhous said she has given and received items in the group, and made friends along the way.

"People I probably wouldn't have met otherwise as I'm pretty socially awkward," she said. "I would rather gift something to someone in need rather than a perfectly good item go in the trash or be sold at the store."

The members may also post to express gratitude for the items they receive. Nicole Schilt said she was grateful for the silk flowers that a group member gave her. She used the flowers at her daughter's wedding, which was arranged on short notice with a

Smedema said the most meaningful part of the group is the positive relationships

"Our goal really isn't just to give or receive items," she said. "We want to foster that sense of community and a gift economy is a great way to do it"

There's a large plaque near one of the corners of the St. Mary Catholic gym that lists the top basketball scorers in school history.

It's not something that is updated yearly, only when a career is complete and final total can be attributed to an individual.

One day soon, Cole Uhlenbrauck will be taking over one of the top spots on that board. Midway through his senior season, Uhlenbrauck has moved into fourth place on the list – he passed John Koslowski on Tuesday – with 1,388 points and with an average output in his next game, could slide into third.

It's something that the four-year varsity starter is proud of.

"I do look at that. It's important to me because it shows the hard work that I have put into my game throughout the years," Uhlenbrauck said. "I keep trying to go up the ladder."


All of the points he has put up are nice and time will tell where he ends up on the list, but that is far from his only focus.

Uhlenbrauck is the leader of the No. 1 ranked Division 4 boys basketball team, which currently sports a 10-0 record. And as much as his career point total will be a part of his legacy when his prep career comes to an end, so is being part of a successful team, and Uhlenbrauck takes as much pride in how the Zephyrs do.

"Being undefeated is really fun – we have never done that before," Uhlenbrauck said. "Everyone, all of our teammates, are working together as one unit and it's been fun to see all of the progress we've made. It's been fun to see it all come together."

St. Mary Catholic's success isn't a surprise for this group. The nucleus of the team has been playing together for a long time and has looked forward to this season, knowing they could set some pretty lofty expectations.

"I thought we would be able to have

something special, but I didn't really realize it until we got to eighth grade or freshman year. I just saw us keep growing together," Uhlenbrauck said. "With that chemistry we have had for so long, we have all thought we could do something special this year."

Uhlenbrauck is one of seven seniors on the roster and that experience has meant a lot to the Zephyrs' success this season. However, just having experience doesn't make a team good.

There is plenty of talent on the roster as well and that mix is at the heart of the team's success.

Uhlenbrauck also credits his teammates for what he's been able to do on the court. Some might think that taking the court

with three other double-figure scorers might limit his scoring, but Uhlenbrauck believes that with as unselfish as the group is, having that much talent around has only helped him succeed.

"It helps because so many people can score the ball, all of the defensive eyes aren't on me," Uhlenbrauck said. "They are on Danny (Griffith) and they are on Fisher (MacKenzie), Michael (Fairweather) or Charlie (Nackers). They can't not play defense on them. They have to guard their own man and so we can just play off each other because they have to see every one of us as a scoring threat. That helps a lot in getting me and others open."

When Uhlenbrauck does get his opportunities to score, he's taking advantage of them.

Through the first 11 games of the year, he is averaging 24.1 points per game, including a career-best 36 points against Elkhart Lake-Glenbeulah, and has been held to less than 19 points only once. More notably, he is shooting 58 percent from the floor and 45 percent from 3-point range this season and has made at least five 3-pointers in a game six times already.

So, there are definitely times when he's feeling good as a shooter, but there is no one way to tell if he's going to be on in a given game.

"Sometimes its shooting around that day when you feel good, you feel energetic and sometimes it is in warm-ups when you are hitting a lot of shots. Or when you are in that game you hit that first shot and it feels good and then you keep getting more confidence and going from there," Uhlenbrauck said. "Your teammates help with that a lot, getting you the ball and knowing if you make one or two, they know to keep feeding you to stay hot."

Uhlenbrauck said he started playing


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
