# Tourist housing limits challenged

# State group contends ordinance too restrictive

The Wisconsin Realtors Association is asking for summary judgment in a lawsuit against the city of Neenah, alleging that the city's tourist housing ordinance violates state law and landowners' rights to use their property as a short-term rental. The growing popularity of short-term rentals, facilitated by apps such as Airbnb and Vrbo, has also brought challenges to some communities.

Common short-term rental complaints include tenants being noisy, greater traffic and a limited availability of long-term rental properties and residential real estate.

In recent months, Ashwaubenon, Green Lake and Monona have engaged in discussions to consider increased restrictions on short-term rentals. The Wisconsin Realtors Association (WRA) first filed a lawsuit in Winnebago County Circuit Court last September on behalf of its 17,500 members, which include residential and commercial real estate sales agents, brokers, appraisers, inspectors, property managers, bankers and other professionals.

The lawsuit challenges Neenah's enforcement of its tourist housing ordinance, which WRA says affects the use of

# Fox Crossing police staffing at high school approved

The Neenah Board of Education approved a three-year contract with the Village of Fox Crossing at a meeting Tuesday, authorizing village police to supply one school resource officer (SRO) at the new high school set to open this fall.

SROs are responsible for law enforcement activities during school hours, with duties that include de-escalating incidents, enforcing ordinances and state laws, investigating crimes that occur on school grounds or reported by students, intervening when a subject presents a threat and assisting in developing school safety plans.

The school district previously employed

one SRO at the high school and one at the middle and elementary schools. Once construction on the high school in Fox Crossing is completed later this year, the district will reconfigure.

Both Neenah and Fox Crossing have been in negotiations with the district over the SRO contracts since last year. With the new high school in Fox Crossing, the district only wanted to fund one SRO in Neenah and one in Fox Crossing.

Both Neenah and Fox Crossing police chiefs spoke at city and school board meetings, stating the need for two SROs from each department. After months of back and forth, the district approved a contract with Neenah in February, autho-

# **Post-pandemic policies evolving**

### Coverage phasing out in some health care areas By Kaitlyn Scoville NEENAH NEWS

Over the next few months, about 15 million Americans are due to lose health care coverage that had been guaranteed during the pandemic.

The U.S. and other groups such as the World Health Organization have been ending emergency orders put in place three years ago to protect citizens in uncertain times.

"Based on current trends, the Department of Health and Human Services is planning for the federal Public Health Emergency for COVID-19 to expire at the end of the day on May 11," a statement from the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services reads. "Thanks to the administration's whole-of-government approach to combatting the virus, we are in a better place in our response than we were three years ago, and we can transition away from an emergency phase."

According to an Associated Press article, the WHO first deemed COVID a global health emergency in January 2020. WHO director-general Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus recently said the pandemic has been "on a downward trend for more than a year, with population immunity increasing from vaccination and infection." That, he said, has allowed most countries "to return to life as we knew it before COVID-19," meaning the worst part of the pandemic is over.

ThedaCare and other health organizations have also been moving their masking policies to optional.

Doug Gieryn, Winnebago County

Health Department health director, said despite these changes there will still be free self-test kits and vaccines available at the department, 112 Otter Ave. in Oshkosh, for as long as the state provides them.

The Health Department is working with other counties and community partners to provide support and referrals for needs such as social services enrollment, housing transitions and alternative resources.

More than 60% of Winnebago County residents have completed the primary vac-



cine series, and about 20% have received the updated booster. More than 313,000 vaccine doses have been administered to county residents since December 2020.

"None of the health department services will completely cease

due to the end of the federal COVID-19 public health emergency," Gieryn said. 'We've modified how we deliver resources for pandemic response based on COVID-19 levels in the areas of data, testing and vaccination. We have transitioned staff resources back toward nonpandemic-related public health work."

As a result of the changes, the program enrollment and renewal processes will change for those using BadgerCare or other Medicaid programs, Gieryn said. Renewals will no longer be automatic. People will need to understand eligibility requirements and how to gather, provide and update their account to stay covered. Coverage for COVID-19 testing and treatment will vary by insurance type.

Additionally, private insurance companies were required to cover COVID tests without co-pays or co-insurance, which will end with the expiration of the public health emergency. Medicare Part B enrollees will still have coverage for COVID-19 tests without cost-sharing for laboratory-conducted (PCR) tests, but there may be a copay for an associated doctor's visit. Access to free overthe-counter tests will end.

People with Medicaid coverage will continue to receive free PCR, rapid antigen and at-home tests through September 2024. After that date, COVID-19 at-home testing coverage will vary by state.

Gieryn said vaccines will remain free for everyone as long as the supply of federally purchased vaccines lasts. Changes in the vaccine program will be precipitated by depletion of federal supply, product expiration or changes in emergency use agreements.

"The ending of the emergency declaration does not mean that COVID-19 is gone, but it does mean that we are transitioning our response," Gieryn said. "The virus is still here and remains a leading cause of death in the U.S. Staying up to date on recommended COVID-19 vaccinations still provides the best protection.

"COVID-19 has become a large part of public health's identity, but we work on so many other issues and provide a range of programs and services to the community that have been masked by the pandemic. Now, more than ever, we are prioritizing our work related to mental health, social connectedness, housing and substance use with a goal of creating and supporting fair opportunities for all people and communities to achieve good health."

Town of Neenah approves ARPA-funded projects

The Town of Neenah approved two expenditures using American Rescue Plan Act dollars totaling about \$367,000 at a meeting last week, while a third expenditure was put on hold.


The town was awarded \$369,166 in state and local fiscal recovery funds under ARPA, which was signed by President Biden in 2021. A resolution approved in March by the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors is expected to deliver another \$145,000 in ARPA funds to each township in Winneba-

go County. The town board met in December to brainstorm potential uses for the money. Suggestions included equipment, fix Larsen Road or

purchase a fire truck. The board also dis-



The town board approved a resolution last week to use \$162,535 to improve Keating Park, situated at 128 Klompen Court, by adding permanent restrooms. Keating Park is 6.3 acres and features a baseball diamond, playground, a wooded area with a walking trail and picnic areas.

The town also approved spending \$204,700 on Town Hall improvements. The funds will be used to replace the HVAC and air exchange system and improve the meeting room and kitchen facilities.

# Veterans see benefits from honoring Poppy Days

The Hawley-Dieckhoff American Legion Post 33 and Auxiliary presents its annual Poppy Days May 25-26, with paper poppies being distributed to businesses within the community.

Poppies are the memorial flower of American veterans who died on the battlefield, with the red poppy symbolizing the blood shed. National Poppy Day is celebrated on the Friday before Memorial Day.

The designation of poppies as a memorial flower began in 1920 based on a poem "In Flanders Fields," written by Lt.-Col. John McCrae while serving on the front lines of World War I.

The poem reads in part: "In Flanders Fields the poppies blow, between the crosses row on row. That mark our place; and in the sky, the larks, still bravely singing, fly. Scarce heard amid the guns below."

Red poppies were initially used as a way to remember and honor those lost in World War I and have expanded to remember every fallen American soldier.

Char Kiesling has been a member of the Legion Auxiliary for 47 years, serving as president of the Post 33 Auxiliary for 11 years. She said the proceeds from Poppy

# High school students compete in state visual arts event

Neenah High School had nine students earn top places at the Wisconsin Art Education Association State Visual Arts Classic competition recently in Madison.

Sienna Murphy, Madelyn Ragean, Maddy Janichek and Marley Van Domelen all earned first-place awards. Grace Koszewa, Keira Nickel, Avery Cowell and Emlyn Swardenski each achieved runner-up finishes and Alix Johnson took home a thirdplace award.

Advised by teacher Emma Santiago, each student brought a long-term piece of art they had been working on based on prompts and mediums that were scored after they arrived. They then participated in an on-site art making event with specific instructions they did not receive until the competition.

Students had two hours to create a piece that was judged and scored, then participated as a team in an art history quiz bowl and a critical thinking problem-solving component. Mayor Jane Lang recently signed a Poppy Proclamation, designating the month of May and specifically May 25-26 as Poppy Days. The proclamation asks residents to pay tribute to those who have made the ultimate sacrifice by wearing the paper flower.

Those little red crepe paper poppies that Americans around the country see being distributed at businesses around their neighborhoods are hand made by hospitalized and disabled veterans. Making the poppies provides a financial and therapeutic benefit to the veterans, according to the Legion.

The Wisconsin American Legion and Auxiliary distributes 350,000 poppies each year. All proceeds are used for rehabilitation of veterans who have been honorably discharged.

The auxiliary is made up of the spouses and female descendants of veterans. The Neenah Auxiliary chapter has 131 members.

Kiesling said the Legion helps veterans in several ways such as giving out gift cards and providing support to veterans whose families are in need.

"It's whatever the veteran would need and ask for," she said.

Poppy Chairman Patti Julius said the Legion also supports veterans' medical needs.

"If they say they're diabetic and they need a special pair of shoes and shoes cost them \$300, we would donate to the family for that," she said.

"I would like to thank the community of Neenah," Kiesling said. "In the past, they have been excellent responders for our poppy drive and Poppy Days."





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# Park View opens new training center

Winnebago County's Park View Health Center's new training center at 725 Butler Ave. officially opened with a ribbon-cutting ceremony May 11 ahead of this week's National Skilled Nursing Care Week.

One of the main purposes of the \$1 million building finished in late 2022 is to train new certified nursing assistants (CNAs) on site. Many are nursing students or have an interest in the nursing field.

"We know health care is going through some tremendous staffing challenges and we hope this is one way to help the county and the community," said Park View administrator Linzi Gazga Parish.

Parish said people can apply as a hospitality aide to be eligible to attend the class. Hospitality aides help support CNAs so they can provide hands-on care.

"This gives them a bird's-eye view of what it is like to work in health care, prior

to entering the class to ensure it is something they really want to do," she said.

Classes with a maximum of eight students are typically three weeks and all classroom and clinical work are completed on site. Students are paid while attending classes as they are considered county employees and are asked to stay employed with the county for at least six months after training.

Three classes are scheduled to start May 30, June 20 and July 11.

CNA instructor and registered nurse Megan Shea has been with Park View for more than 10 years. Sarah Silverthorn, CNA coordinator and 20-year Park View employee, also helps with the class under the direction of the instructor.

A recently approved paid feeding assistant program will also operate out of the training center, and has already trained 17 staff members.

# **Covey housing project** teams up county, FVTC

Covey, Fox Valley Technical College and Winnebago County came together to break ground last week on a four-bedroom, fully accessible home for adults with disabilities in Neenah.

Project planning began a few years ago when Covey was being asked by many of their families if they would offer residential programs for their loved ones.

Covey is a respite care and adult day program group that has been providing care and creating skill-building opportunities for adults with disabilities since 1954. Covey offers in-home and out-ofhome care for individuals.

"Research indicated that safe affordable and supportive housing was in very short supply and very high demand," said Pam Shutz, Covey chief executive. "Not only for our families that we currently serve, but for many families in Winnebago County caring for someone with a disability."

Covey approached FVTC's residential construction program about building the home. Every year the program builds a typical house and this year, they were ready to take on the task of making one fully accessible.

Gov. Tony Evers awarded Winnebago

ways. The entrance is a "zero entry" with no stairs leading up to the front door.

The home will feature special doorknobs for residents who have dexterity issues and a roll-in shower to allow for wheelchair entry. Sections of the countertops in the kitchen will be lower for people in wheelchairs and there will be grab bars placed in areas to help residents be independent.

This is the first project Covey has collaborated with FVTC on.

"It is just so exciting," Shutz said. "They have been as passionate as we are about making this a beautiful place for people to live."

She is proud of the work Covey is doing and wants people to understand just how important it is right now.

"People aren't doing (this)," Shutz said. "Unfortunately, between COVID, the staffing crisis and low reimbursement rates, a lot of adult family homes are closing."

Providers are closing because they are no longer financially viable. She understands the risk they are taking but feels confident that they will succeed.

"We feel like we have enough support and enough creativity to be successful in meeting this need for people," Shutz said. This accessible home is one of three Covey has in the works. Another will be in Winnebago County and the other home in Green Bay. While this home in Neenah will likely be most of the residents' forever home, Covey may gear one of the others to help people gain a greater level of independence so they can eventually live on their own. The Neenah home is set to be completed by next spring and residents moving in soon after.

# Add appeal to your outdoor space by growing hops

You don't have to be a homebrewer, or even a beer drinker, to grow and appreciate hops.

What many people see as the most important ingredient in beer (secret: it's not; that would be water), hops provide a wonderful bitter taste and aroma, from piney to spicy, floral to fruity. Their numerous varieties help make each beer unique, and many new strains are regularly being introduced into craft brewing. It's hard to keep up.

Hops also make a wonderful addition to your garden or outdoor lounge area. They grow easily, flower beautifully in late summer, and return year after year without effort from you.

Technically speaking, Humulus lupulus is the plant, and hops are the flowers from that plant. Yet, for this article, we're being lazy and calling the entire plant "hops."

Later in this article, you'll read about a no-cost opportunity to start growing your own hops at home. Right now, let's dive into why hops are so much fun.

Hops take about a year to get fully get established and become a healthy, thriving plant. However, once they take hold and grow at their full potential, hops will climb along many surfaces and can cover enough area to provide shade over a favorite garden bench or two.

Instead of vines, typical of grapes, hops grow bines from which they produce flowers. These turn into hop cones and are used in the brewing process right off the bine or condensed into pellets for commercial brewing.

You can even pick and crush fresh hop cones and drop them into any beer to provide a burst of bitterness and aroma. We use a simple French press, which minimizes the mess in a cool, frothy pint.

You can also donate fresh hop cones to several local breweries (if they're brewing a "wet hop" batch in the fall), and some homebrew clubs will accept them. Of course, if you decide to learn to brew beer yourself, you'll have one ingredient ready to go.

One important downside to growing hops is that, in large quantities, they're toxic and potentially deadly to dogs and, more rarely, cats. According to the ASPCA, hops in any form, fresh or spent (after brewing) can be dangerous for dogs. So, if you can't isolate your hops from your pets, or be confident they won't eat the plant, it may not be the best choice for you.

You now know the flowers turn into hop cones, and the vines are called bines. Now, let's explore hop roots, or rhizomes. These are plant stems that grow hori-



surface oftentimes feet away from the main plant.

Rhizomes are used to grow new hop plants. A simple cutting of a pencil-thickness stem can be replanted in a sunny area, and they usually grow wonderfully without much care required. All they need is something to vertically climb up — a fence, a trellis, some wire, etc. — and the bines will grab hold and shoot up.

Hops climb in a spiral pattern around whatever structure is available, using stiff hairs that provide friction to grab a surface. Vines, on the other hand, use tendrils or suckers to climb, which is a main difference between vines and bines.

This is a hearty, aggressive plant. Not only do hop rhizomes stay healthy and dormant over a long Wisconsin winter, sending up asparagus-like shoots every spring, they grow at a fierce pace.

We've measured peak midsummer growth at 12 inches in one 24-hour period. While that's not a constant growth rate, it does give you an idea of what hops are capable of. We've seen one well-established hop plant grow up the side of a home and across a powerline to the other side of the street.

Ready to get some hops? Hop rhizomes are regularly traded between homebrewers and others who just appreciate the plant. Another option is to find online stores selling hop rhizomes of nearly every variety, although we haven't obtained any through purchase. Today, we'll help you get some for nothing.

The authors of "Wife + Husband = Beer" appreciated our readers, and we have more than enough hops to share. Our Willamette hops have been flourishing for years (they annually climb up and over our garage). Typically, this variety of hops is used to add aroma to beer, and it's light on the bitterness, as compared to Citra, the high alpha acid hop and most popular variety used in craft brewing.

All you need to do is email us at wife. husband.beer@gmail.com, and we'll dig up some rhizomes and get them to you soon along with basic planting instructions. Try it out and see what you think of growing your own.

properties and their sale.

In Neenah, city ordinance requires that operators of tourist housing properties submit an application, obtain a permit and meet a number of requirements.

Documents indicate WRA is challenging several specific tourist housing requirements that it claims violate state law and put its members and residents at a disadvantage compared to other communities.

Neenah requires that tourist housing properties be the primary residence of the applicant. WRA contends that Wisconsin statutes do not define a residential dwelling as being the primary residence of the applicant.

"If the city is allowed to enforce this restriction, it results in the owners of residential properties within the city being treated unequally than the owners of residential properties in other municipalities within Wisconsin that do not have this unlawful provision in their ordinances," WRA wrote.

Neenah limits the number of days a tourist housing property may be rented to 120 days within a calendar year. WRA argues that Wisconsin statutes allow a municipality to limit the total days that the property may be rented, but "no fewer than 180 days," indicating the city may be violating the statute by setting a time restriction that is greater than the legal

limit.

The city's tourist housing ordinance and application each include a provision that permits, once granted, may be revoked by the director of community development for cause.

WRA wrote that the city does not include a definition of what cause entails and does not state objective reasons or a due process hearing for revocation of a tourist housing permit.

Municipalities in Wisconsin are permitted to add restrictions to short-term rentals up to the limits set by state law. WRA noted in legal filings that a municipality may not enact or enforce an ordinance that is contrary to state statutes.

The city defended its tourist housing ordinance in an answer it filed, stating

that WRA does not have standing to bring a suit against the city and no justifiable controversy exists between Neenah and WRA.

Late last month, WRA filed a motion for declaratory and summary judgment. WRA also asked the court to enjoin the city from enforcing the ordinance.

WRA is not asking for monetary damages, noting that damages are remedial, not preventive, and not an adequate remedy in this case.

WRA and City Attorney David Rashid did not respond to a request for comment.

Circuit Court Judge Daniel Bissett is expected to issue an oral ruling in the lawsuit at a court date scheduled for July 19.

# Young workers looking for area lawns to trim

Four teenagers are looking for local lawns to mow as part of a nationwide challenge to mow 100 of them for free for those in need.

Jacob, 18; William, 17; Nicholas, 15; and Zachary, 13, of Neenah, are participating in the 50 Yard Challenge by Raising Men & Women Lawn Care Service. The family joined the cause last year as a way to give back to the community.

The challenge encourages kids to mow 50 lawns for free for the elderly, disabled, veterans or anyone in need. Families who sign up three or more children for the challenge agree to mow 100 lawns. Once they complete the challenge, they'll each receive a new lawn mower, weed eater and blower.

The boys' mother, Amy Jape, said that after mowing all last summer, they are just over halfway to their goal of 100. She said they're looking for locals lawns to help complete the challenge.

The boys are mowing within 15 minutes of central Neenah. Participants must clean up lawn ornaments, pet excrement and toys before they arrive. The teens are allowed to spend a maximum of two hours.

The boys show up in groups of two or more. As a requirement of the challenge, they take a photo of every lawn before and after completion.

The mowing is free but the kids are allowed to accept tips, which cover the cost of gas. They're not allowed to accept food or drinks. Jape explained that Zac has diabetes.

The 50 Yard Challenge was started by Alabama resident Rodney Smith Jr., who founded the nonprofit Raising Men & Women Lawn Care Service. It is funded entirely on public donations used to purchase the lawnmowers, weed eaters and blowers that are donated to children.

Smith was inspired to start the organization during his senior year of high school when he saw an elderly man struggling to mow his lawn and volunteered to help him. Smith has since mowed lawns in all 50 states.

This year, 4,466 children in eight countries are participating in the challenge. There are 82 participants in Wisconsin.

rizing two SROs at the middle and elementary schools.

Under the contract, the district will pay \$80,000 per SRO, which covers 75% of the costs for each officer for 39 weeks of the 52-week school year. Taxpayers will fund the remaining 13 weeks, an estimated \$50,000.

The contract approved at Tuesday's meeting authorizes one SRO at the high school in Fox Crossing. The district will pay \$92,500 for the first year and will also provide a one-time stipend of \$10,000.

The amount will cover all costs and expenses associated with SRO services including salary, benefits, equipping the SRO with a squad vehicle, computer, body-worn video camera and other necessary policing equipment. with Fox Crossing in 2020 to annex the property for the high school.

The district committed to paying a total of \$103,000 for a Fox Crossing SRO, which is the cost if the district were to use the previous formula of covering 75% for a year. The \$10,000 one-time stipend is to cover the difference between the contracted amount and the amount the district previously agreed upon.

After the first year, the district will continue to pay the \$92,500 each of the next two years, subject to review and adjustments each year. Costs associated with duties carried out at events that would normally be considered overtime will also be reviewed.

Included in the contract is a stipulation that the district and village agree to meet on or around January and May of each year to review the SRO program, call volume, responses and anticipated needs in the future to ensure proper staffing of the position.

The Fair is held in August of each year. Each child receives a backpack containing supplies for them to start the school year prepared to achieve academic success and a certificate for a pair of shoes redeemable at Rogan's.

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Superintendent Mary Pfeiffer said there are two primary differences between the Neenah and Fox Crossing contracts, with the first pertaining to overtime.

While the Neenah contract authorizes overtime that the district must pay when it calls SROs to assist with after-school or other events occurring within the city, the district will not pay overtime for the Fox Crossing SRO, including overtime for attending events where police coverage is deemed necessary.

"The \$92,500 is all inclusive, I would say, so no matter when we call on an officer to assist us after school this would encompass all of that," Pfeiffer said.

The other major change is the addition of a \$10,000 stipend, which is only authorized for one year. Pfeiffer explained that the stipend is related to conversations Several board members raised the question of whether the Neenah and Fox Crossing SROs will collaborate with each other.

Pfeiffer said there was some confusion about overall jurisdiction by both the Neenah and Fox Crossing police chiefs, but now there's more clarity and she hopes the departments will be prepared to collaborate.

"As you know, the chief stood and said, 'I want two officers,' and without data to support a fourth officer, our ambition is to collect that but also to recognize the need for collaboration," she said. "So, do we really need another one or is that collaborative effort going to be sufficient?"

The school board voted 8-1 in favor of the Fox Crossing SRO contract, with Kristian Sahr voting against.

"That was so fun. They had a phenomenal year," Satchel Moss said. "It was so fun cheering him on with the whole family there and hoping that one day I would be in the same spot and here I am."

Seniors showing leadership is a benchmark of the Neenah tennis program and has played a role in its history of success.


