# Walmart files fifth lawsuit against city

## Retail giant continues property tax challenges

Retail giant Walmart has filed another lawsuit against the city of Neenah over the assessed value of its West Winneconne Avenue storefront.

The Arkansas-based Walmart Real Estate Business Trust is seeking to lower the assessed value of the property by \$5.07

million for 2023, which would reduce the retailer's property taxes.

The suit was filed July 22 and joins six lawsuits Walmart has filed against municipalities across Wisconsin this year and more than 30 filed in the state last year aimed at reducing its tax burden through a contentious "dark store" strategy.

Walmart and other large retailers challenge local tax assessments by arguing that the value of their properties should be assessed as if they were vacant "dark" properties. Walmart's legal team asserts that by assessing properties based on their use as functioning retail spaces, the city is imposing an unfair tax burden.

The company claims this practice leads to an overestimation of store values, which results in higher property taxes than necessary; municipalities argue the strategy shifts more of the tax burden from commercial property owners to homeowners and small businesses.

This is the fifth time Walmart has sued

# City's first female police captain breaking barriers

The Neenah Police Department has achieved a historic milestone with the appointment of Amy Wagner as captain of operations, marking the first time in its 151year history that a woman has joined the command staff.

Wagner, 48, grew up in Green Bay and graduated from the University of Wisconsin Oshkosh.

She earned her rank by serving Neenah for 25 years, a community that together with wife Kathy and sons Oliver, Elliott and Finley has become home.

"I love the city, I still love the job, I still learn every day," she said. "I love the support that our police department has from our community."

For Wagner, there was no defining moment that led to her decision to pursue a career in what is traditionally a male-dominated field.

"I wanted something different every day, I did not want routine and I wanted to make a difference," she said.

In recent decades, about 20% of officers employed by the Neenah Police Department have been women, exceeding the 13.1% nationwide average in 2021, according to Statista.

The very first female officer with the Neenah Police Department was Rhonda Jagla, who was hired in 1981 and resigned in 1989, just 10 years before Wagner was hired.

# Jobless rate rises in region for June

The Oshkosh-Neenah metropolitan area and Winnebago County saw a jump in its unemployment rate from 2.8% to 3.1% between May and June, according to preliminary data from the state Department of Workforce Development.

Last June's jobless rate in Osh-kosh-Neenah MSA and Winnebago County was 3.3%.

The non-seasonally adjusted data shows jobless rates in Metropolitan Statistical Areas rose in all of Wisconsin's 12 metro areas over the month but were still lower or unchanged compared with the previous year.

Unemployment rates increased in all of Wisconsin's 35 largest cities over the month year and were lower or unchanged compared with the previous year.



# Former school site cleared to make room for helipad

The clearing of the property across from ThedaCare Regional Medical Center-Neenah, which previously housed Roosevelt Elementary School, is nearly complete, with only the final landscaping touches remaining.

Construction work to raze the site began a year ago to make way for the ThedaStar air medical helipad and emergency landing area, which is 1,000 feet away.

Lynn Detterman, Senior Vice President of ThedaCare South Region, said the team needed to balance the significant amount of rain seen in the area this summer with completing some of the construction steps.

The 100-year-old school situated on 2 acres adjacent to the hospital was slated for closure after the 2022-23 school year as part of the district's restructuring plan. Local businessman John Bergstrom and other community members purchased it for \$1 million in 2022 and donated the site to ThedaCare.

The helipad was completed last July,

moving its landing spot and hangar from near the W.G. Bryan Bridge to a site near the Emergency Department for rapid transfer of patients.

That September, a resident on East Forest Avenue contacted police to file a noise complaint against the helicopter.

Bergstrom said that other uses for the



property - including housing - were initially considered but due to concerns over the proximity of the helipad it was determined the best use would be to demolish the building, clear the site and landscape it.

Those driving by on E. North Water Street may have noticed that a monument has been installed facing the hos-

"No act of kindness, no matter how small, is ever wasted," the monument's inscription reads. "In honor of the decades of service provided by our hospital volunteers. Your spirit, energy and commitment deeply touches our community. God bless you all."

The monument was placed by a hospital donor to honor ThedaCare's team of volunteers who provide support for patients, families and team members.

"Volunteers provide thousands of hours of service throughout the ThedaCare system," Detterman said. "Our volunteers help the hospital system function each day and they are a critical part of helping provide exceptional care for our communities."

Bergstrom said last year that future uses for the Roosevelt site could change, though Detterman said at this time there are no updates to share.

"At the Neenah campus, expansion is impacted due to the river on two sides of the hospital," she said. "When the opportunity was presented to acquire this adjacent property, we knew it was a good opportunity. We are grateful to John Bergstrom's ongoing support of ThedaCare, as he facilitated the purchase."

# Auto dealership fraud scheme targets local business

A fraud involving the use of a stolen identity to purchase a vehicle has made its way to Wisconsin, with a Neenah automotive dealership the target.

Headlines in Florida, Utah and New York have warned of the scam in recent months. It involves a new car buyer who communicates with a dealer electronically or over the phone to purchase a vehicle and have it delivered to a different location.

These individuals use stolen identities to secure financing and complete the purchase, driving off with a new car and leaving an unsuspecting identity-theft victim with the bill.

Last October, Danielle M. Shelton, 45, used the identity of a 70-year-old woman to purchase a 2022 GMC Sierra over the phone from a dealership in Neenah, according to a criminal complaint.

Shelton sent an email with her driver's license that had a Maryland address. During the credit application process, an initial loan application fell through after she had trouble answering some of the questions. A different lender approved \$65,734 in financing.

Shelton was able to purchase the truck without ever entering the dealership and have it shipped out of state.

On Jan. 19, the dealership contacted police after a woman called about a bill she received for a truck pay-

ment and denied purchasing the vehicle.

The lender's findings revealed inconsistencies in the application and signatures and informed the dealership it needed to pay back \$60,000.

The picture on the driver's license was of a younger female and didn't match the date of birth listed in 1954. The city listed on the application was in Texas, but the address was in Maryland.

The buyer's employment was listed as

nursing, but a credit bureau reported she was a housekeeper. Among other inconsistencies, one of the phone numbers listed on the application had a report of fraud on it.

Police were informed that the dealership received notice about the vehicle having a VIN inspection completed in Maryland and it was at a Chevrolet dealership in Texas. Investigators worked with Dallas police to set up a plan to have Shelton pick up a loaner vehicle and she was taken into custody at that time.

Shelton is facing felony charges in Winnebago County of theft by false representation and misappropriating identification to obtain money. A warrant was issued for her arrest last week after she failed to show up to court for an initial appearance.

District Attorney Eric Sparr said a few similar cases of identity fraud have been prosecuted by his office in recent years.

Third party identity fraud is one of the most common frauds targeting auto dealerships, according to Experian. While auto dealers have an obligation to thwart financial schemes, residents can also take proactive steps to safeguard themselves against identity theft.

The Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection recommends that residents monitor their credit report for any unauthorized activities, such as unfamiliar transactions, to detect and deal with potential fraud early.



## **Voter ID information available from DMV**

# Coffee shop owner brews up connections in community

During a time when many coffee shops blend into the urban landscape, one local gem stands out for brewing more than just a good cup of coffee.

At Shellattes, situated on Doty Island central to Neenah and Menasha, connections are made over what owner Shelly Baeten describes as the two C's: coffee and community.

Shelly recently announced she plans to transition into semi-retirement and reduce the business' hours after more than a decade of serving up coffee and conversation in the Fox Valley. Though the shop's hours are being slightly reduced, Shelly said she and the business aren't going anywhere.

Shelly, 62, and husband Ken opened Shellattes in 2011 in a 130-year-old building that previously housed several other coffee shops and a bakery.

Shelly is the face of the business while Ken is the payroll supervisor, maintenance man and early-morning brewer.

Though initially the couple lived in Appleton, about 10 years ago they moved into space above the shop.

"So it's like that little Italian grandma who used to live upstairs and all the grandkids would come over for lunch on Sundays," she said.

A picture of Shelly's own Grandma has hung on the wall since opening. A "fabulous" cook, baker and cake decorator, Shelly has tried to emulate her.

"That smell of the coffee percolating; you'll see particularly old percolators around here, and I think of Grandma then," she said. "I think Grandma would be

proud."

Sitting at a table in a lovely little reading room at the shop early this week, Shelly does indeed exude the warm, caring, grandmotherly traits that attract patrons and employees who keep in touch years later.

She started in food service as a teenager and later transitioned into the corporate world while raising her family. Son Chad, 35, lives in Little Chute and daughter Katie, 36, lives in Neenah.

Blending the elements of a coffee shop, bistro and bakery with a community living room, bookstore and resale boutique, the cozy atmosphere has made Shellattes a favorite spot for many in Neenah, a city that Shelly has grown to love.

"It's very homey; it's nice going outside and someone drives by and beeps," she said. "It's nice being able to greet people in the store. I like the small-town feel."

Knick knacks, decorations, collectables and art adorn the shop, most of it for sale. The items make the space more welcoming and give people something to talk about – pots from her late mother's house, a coffee urn and tea pot from a thrift store that matched the set her grandma used to have, Sanka mugs that remind her of her late father making his cup of Sanka in the morning.

"So it's just things that make me happy and it makes the community happy, as well," she said.

Most important to Shelly are the relationships she has forged and memories made over the years.

"The happy ones, sad ones, but also great memories of those customers who came in every single day, or once a week, or even

once a month," she said. "It's just nice to have that. My family has grown a lot."

A group of regulars shows up almost every morning to support the shop. Its founding member, Burton Rosenthal – known at the coffee shop as Butter Rum Burt – passed away in 2022. Shelly visited him in the hospital before his passing and was mentioned in his obituary.

Another regular customer and member of the group was Kai "Pita" Kotobalavu, lead singer of Unity the Band and a well-loved community member. Kotobalavu lost his battle with cancer early this year. An art piece with his likeness is now displayed at Shellattes to honor his memory.

"You know, there are happy times, but also when you lose someone, they're like a family member you're losing," she said.

Tim Bergstrom of Bergstrom Automotive is a regular there. He said Shelly takes the time to make all her patrons feel special.

"She welcomes all with her great big smile, stops the world by being present with you in an all too busy world and then gives you the gift of leaving in a better mood because she shared her positive and caring heart with you," he said.

Sunlight streamed through the windows and the rich aroma of coffee filled the air Tuesday as Shelly strolled through Shellattes, stopping to greet several customers by name and chat.

"I think what's changed a lot in our communities is social skills, and being able to communicate and be able to talk to people, and so I do really treasure that about having a place where everyone's welcome," she

Having lost her mother last year and her father in 2017, Shelly said family is even more important to her. She hopes to use her extra time traveling and with family and friends. Her daughter Katie, an employee and regular face at the shop, plans to carry on the family business.

Humble and hardworking, Shelly has become a cherished member of the community, turning her regulars into a close-knit family and making each visit feel like coming home.

Though Wagner acknowledged that joining the department was intimidating at first, colleagues welcomed her with open arms.

"The women that I started with were showing me the way and guiding me, and all the guys turned into my brothers and watched out for me and showed me the right way to do things," she said.

Fresh out of college in her early 20s, she had much to learn.

"This job is not black and white; it is very gray, and no two calls are the same and no two situations are the same, and just trying to do the best for that specific situation is what I'm always trying to do," she said.

She was hired during a time when open police positions would often receive hundreds of applications.

In recent years, in the wake of several high-profile police brutality incidents and the Black Lives Matter movement, officers across the country have faced greater scrutiny and there has been a decline in police officer applicants.

"Even when things were horrific in other

parts of the country, we always felt the support here," Wagner said.

For 23 years she patrolled the streets of Neenah, moving up the ranks to sergeant and lieutenant.

"There's extra pressure to work harder than everybody else and do better than everybody else, to prove that you deserve to be here," she said.

Though it wasn't easy, failure was not an option because "I felt if I failed, I made all the women look bad."

She credits the support of her family for getting her through the tough times.

"There were times where I wasn't sure if this is what I wanted to do and times where we have to reevaluate and think, is it worth the family struggles? And is it worth the missing holidays and missing family events? And to realize it is for me. It's worth it."

There have also been the rewarding moments, such as when she engages with a resident and achieves her goal of making a meaningful impact.

"It's the rare occasions that people will stop you and thank you for something that you did for them," she said. "It's years later, that you don't think about at the time, a decision to arrest or not arrest makes a difference. I've had people thank me for both: 'Thank you for arresting me, I changed my life after that.'"

In 2022, Wagner was promoted to investigative service lieutenant, a position that allowed her to focus on solving cases, supporting victims and coming to successful resolutions.

"When I was on patrol it's so much more fast paced that you just have to go from call to call, but you don't necessarily have that time to connect like you do when you're back here," she said.

Over the past two decades, Wagner has worked under four police chiefs and seen many changes in policing, the biggest being the advancements in technology.

"To have the full-blown capabilities of computer access in your squad to do research and look things up, to body cameras and squad cameras, cellphones, you know, technology with how we solve cases, is completely different today than it was 25 years ago," she said.

Her accomplishments include being a member of the SWAT team, field training officer, peer support team member, firearms instructor, crisis intervention team member, critical incident stress debrief peer, station dog supervisor, field training officer supervisor and serving on several committees.

Assistant Police Chief Jeff Bernice said staff knew that Wagner was the right person for captain because of her strengths, values and professionalism, adding that she possesses the ability to immediately connect with a person and establish a trusted relationship.

"Amy will serve as a pillar of strength to many young children and both women and men because she is a true law enforcement professional," he said. "She has the highest ethical standards, the courage to do what is right, the spirit of a warrior and she follows Chief Olson's directions of treating everyone with dignity and respect to the uppermost degree."

Wagner admits she doesn't like to be in the spotlight. But by breaking barriers, she has become a role model for young women to look up to.

"Find your passion and stick with it," she advised. "There are times you're going to feel like you've failed, but get back up and keep going. We've all made mistakes, but it's what you do and what you learn from those mistakes."

Neenah, challenging the property assessments each year from 2019-2023. The lawsuits from 2019-2021 were consolidated into one case that seeks to lower the assessed value from \$11.49 million to \$8.14 million each year. The lawsuits challenging the 2022 and 2023 assessments seek to lower the value from \$11.59 million to \$6.52 million.

"Upon information and belief, the 2024 assessment was not uniform with the assessment of other properties in the city and state and therefore violate the Uniformity Clause of the United States Constitution," Walmart wrote in its complaint.

Though the city has not yet filed its response to the latest lawsuit, attorneys for Neenah previously argued that Walmart fails to state any facts supporting the allegation that the assessment of the property is not uniform with other properties in the city and throughout the state.

Walmart is seeking a refund of taxes paid plus interest. If Walmart were to prevail in all its lawsuits against Neenah, the reduced assessments would result in a total refund of \$436,641 for 2019-2023, without interest calculations.

Community Development Director Chris Haese said that due to the ongoing lawsuits the city is limited in information it can provide but if adjustments are needed to Walmart's tax bill, "the deficit created will unfortunately have to be covered by the balance of Neenah's taxpayers."

In a similar series of legal battles, Walmart and the city of Oshkosh reached settlements in 2019 and 2023 to resolve six disputes related to the retailer's property assessments, with Oshkosh reimbursing Walmart a total of \$191,400.

Last year, the Wisconsin Supreme Court issued a decision that undermines the dark store legal strategy, ruling that the city of Delavan's assessments of the Lowes location were not excessive and the value of dark and distressed properties is not comparable to an occupied, operating property.

The ruling was expected to muzzle Walmart's dark store lawsuits in the state but the retailer has continued filing them, focusing on jurisdictions that may have different interpretations and applications of the law.


