## Theater, fieldhouse reopen in Menasha

### Former UW campus facilities will be used

Winnebago County has inked an agreement to reopen the theater and fieldhouse facilities at the Winnebago Fox campus in Menasha.

The county and Wisconsin Entertain-

ment Group Venue Partners (WEG) agreed to a one-year deal for WEG to offer a wide range of events from theater productions and concerts to expos and athletic events.

The facilities have been closed since the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh shuttered the campus June 30, 2025. The county took ownership on July 1 of last year and secured keeping open the campus child care center by working

with the Menasha Joint School District and reopening the Barlow Planetarium. Faith Technologies Inc. in December expressed interest in using the site as a training facility and signed a letter of intent, but after three months decided not to purchase the site.

At that point, County Executive Gordon Hintz said the focus turned to

## Hometown artist premieres solo debut on New York stage

There is something especially meaningful about watching a hometown artist step onto a New York City stage for a solo debut. For those in the Fox Cities who have followed Josh Thone's journey, that moment feels both thrilling and deeply personal.

From his roots in Northeast Wisconsin to prestigious stages in Manhattan, Thone's career reflects talent, dedication and an unwavering commitment to storytelling through song.

Thone is an award-winning performer and director, whose work blends the elegance of jazz with the heart and emotion-

al resonance of musical theater. Over the years, he has built a career that bridges the Midwest and the East Coast, honoring his Wisconsin roots, while earning recognition on some of the country's most celebrated stages.

Thone last month made his solo debut in New York City, performing in "To: Wisconsin, From: NYC, With Love" at the S4 Below venue.

When Thone returns to perform in Neenah and the greater Fox Cities area,

it still is special for him, often becoming more than just another concert. The audience often includes former teachers, classmates, family friends and early mentors, who witnessed the very beginning of the journey. For Thone, those performances are both grounding and deeply meaningful.

"They serve as a reminder of where I started, and of the community that helped nurture my ambitions," Thone said.

He recently performed at the Fox Cities Performing Arts Center in the Center Stage High School Musical Theatre Program's 10-year anniversary concert alongside fellow alumni. That night, he closed the evening with his rendition of "This Is

the Moment" from Jekyll & Hyde, a song he previously sang in that very building in 2022 when he performed for the Jimmy Awards.

His last solo appearance at the Fox Cities PAC was his debut solo concert, which later earned him the Broadway World Award for Best Concert/Cabaret/Solo Performance.

Performing on the Fox Cities PAC stage as part of the Center Stage program, which other performers this year will have the opportunity to do May 16, was an early highlight of Thone's journey.

"I had always dreamed of performing

# County guides residents in post-flood clean-up process

Winnebago County officials will help municipalities and their residents start cleaning up when floodwater across the area begins receding.

Winnebago County Health Officer Doug Gieryn said the goal is to help minimize adverse consequences for impacted businesses and homeowners.

“We had some businesses impacted from flooding and our goal is to get them back up and running as soon as we can,” he said. “We provide a supportive response informing them about clean-up hazards, what items to keep, what not to keep, if they lost power what food should be tossed and making sure their drinking water is safe.”

If a well was flooded, Gieryn said it needs to be disinfected with a strong chlorine solution or chlorine tablets. Residents can do it themselves or a professional can help. Afterward, the county can provide free water testing kits to make sure the water is safe to drink.

The health department has also shared information about cleaning certain items, deciding what to throw away due to concerns about mold and wearing personal protective equipment when cleaning.

This spring’s flooding is the county’s first major flooding event since 2008. Back then, the flood was contained to urban Oshkosh and was caused primarily by heavy rainfall. Winnebago County Emergency Director Eric Rasmussen said this year’s flooding is spread out over a wider distance and time.

Streets in Neenah have been covered in water as the Fox River has spilled over its banks in spots. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) Chicago District is actively managing high water levels on Lake Winnebago, with all gates at the Neenah and Menasha dams opened in April to maximize outflow.

The Neenah Parks and Recreation Department said Tuesday the Kimberly Point shoreline sustained significant damage due to recent weather. Park staff was working to restore access and said to use caution in the area.

Rasmussen said his department’s role is to come alongside local municipalities and help them navigate the clean-

up process. The department instructed municipalities to divide the waste from the flood into vegetation, construction debris and household items like furniture and boxes.

“We are doing what we can to get our communities to recover,” he said. “The lake levels will remain high for another week and some properties still have a lot of water on them. We want to make sure the water levels are going down and staying down.”

Once the waste is gathered, local communities decide whether there will be curbside pickups or a centralized pick-up location. Winnebago County Solid Waste works with municipalities to make sure they still follow recycling and landfill rules, such as no vegetation in the landfill, during the special collection, said Kathy Hutter, director of Winnebago County Solid Waste.

“We need to keep things in separate piles — demolition items need to be separate from household items for example,” she said. “We’ve also worked with municipalities to give them a list of vendors who would be available to do special recycling pickups or electronics pickups for their communities.”

The Department of Emergency Management and local municipalities distributed a lot of sandbags and Rasmussen said each community will have advice on how to take care of them.

“They are full of bacteria. You can’t just dump that sand in your backyard sandbox,” he said. “Follow the advice you receive from your community leaders.”

The City of Neenah has been supplying sandbags as needed at two locations: Friendship Trail parking lot and the corner of High Street and W. North Water Street. The city said it would update when used sandbags will be collected.

The city plans to schedule multiple special collections of flood-damaged items. Any metal and appliances (non-Freon) must be called in to arrange collection, the city said.

Gieryn said recovery is a long process, and it is important to connect people to the necessary resources.

The county is communicating information about flood-water dangers, what to do when re-entering a home, the clean-up process, health dangers and more through various Facebook pages. It also created an online Flood Recovery guide.

The Emergency Management Department will begin damage assessments next week. This information will be essential in case the area qualifies for federal disaster dollars. Rasmussen said there are a lot of steps to go through for the area to qualify for federal disaster dollars.

Residents are encouraged to call 211 to report any property damage. 211 keeps track of the information and county officials will use it to track what areas need clean-up help.

on the PAC stage in any capacity," Thone said. "Stepping foot on that stage feels surreal every time."

Thone was named Best Leading Actor at the 2022 Center Stage Awards. Thone said even nearly five years after going to the Jimmy Awards through Center Stage, he has never forgotten the support he's received from his family at the Fox Cities PAC and through the Center Stage program. He had gone to Center Stage Showcases growing up.

"I believe every single one until my school, Xavier High School, participated in 2022," Thone said. "Being able to have such a vast exposure of the arts through the Fox Cities PAC and in Neenah growing up was one of a kind and special."

Thone recently made his professional debut in Skylight Music Theatre's Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dream Coat during the 2025 holiday season. In that three-month run, he achieved his dream of performing full-time on one of his favorite Milwaukee stages. Before joining the company of Joseph, Thone starred in the Milwaukee Opera Theatre's reimagined H.M.S. Pinafore as Ralph Rackstraw.

Beyond performing, Thone is the executive director of Josh Thone and Company LLC, his own production company. Through this venture, he has produced multiple sold-out events, including his direction of Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dream coat.

Thone's formative years in the Fox Cities played a significant role in shaping his artistic identity. Like many Midwestern artists, Thone's early experiences were rooted in community productions, school

performances and regional training programs.

"The tight-knit arts community of Northeast Wisconsin provided opportunities for young performers to explore theater, music and leadership from an early age," Thone said. "Those environments instilled not only discipline and professionalism, but also a deep appreciation for collaboration."

Thone's time studying at Milwaukee's Peck School of the Arts further developed his technical foundation. His career development reflects steady growth rather than overnight success. His mom, Becky Thone, is someone he looks up to deeply. One lesson he carries with him throughout his career is her reminder of "quality over quantity."

Thone has taken small, intentional steps that have planted seeds throughout his career. From regional stages to national competitions, from ensemble roles to solo features, he has expanded his artistic reach step by step. He said each opportunity built upon the last, gradually widening his audience, while remaining connected to his roots.

"There is also an added sense of joy and gratitude in those moments," Thone said.

While New York City stages offer prestige and visibility, hometown audiences offer something different: shared history.

"The applause feels personal," he said. "The stories land with deeper resonance. The music becomes a celebration not just of individual success, but of community pride."

As Thone prepared for his NYC solo debut, the connection to home has remained central; his journey from Neenah to New York is not a departure from his roots.

"It is an extension of them," he said. The storytelling warmth, the blend of

jazz and musical theater, and the commitment to authenticity can all be traced back to the Midwest values that shaped him.

"I didn't have to venture out far growing up to experience high quality arts entertainment," Thone said. "It was right here in my backyard. My NYC solo show debut was a huge acknowledgement of that."

His NYC solo debut April 4 blended the concept of the stage act he has toured around Wisconsin since last summer with a focus on celebrating the journey from small-town Wisconsin beginnings to the New York City Broadway scene through intimate storytelling, laughter and powerhouse performances from Wisconsin-raised artists now thriving in NYC and beyond.

Featuring music made famous by small-town legends and Broadway favorites, including: "Coat of Many Colors," "Exile," "Not the Boy Next Door," "Brave" and "Look to the Rainbow," Thone creates

a nostalgic, joy-filled atmosphere that blends original music, shared memories and a celebration of where we come from.

Under the musical direction, and accompaniment of Neenah native Jack Murphy, the evening welcomed a line-up of guest artists, whose journeys echo the heart of the show, from small-town Wisconsin to the Big Apple.

Thone hopes his journey from local stages such as the Fox Cities PAC for the Center Stage program to New York City is an inspiration for other young performers.

"It reinforces the importance of arts education and regional support systems, and it reminds young performers currently sitting in local auditoriums that their dreams are possible, too," he said.

Thone's career is still unfolding, but he said one thing is certain: no matter how far the stage may be from home, Neenah and the greater Fox Cities will always be part of his story.

# Neenah looks to fill alderman position

The City of Neenah is seeking applications to fill a vacancy for an alderperson in the second district.

The vacancy was created with the election of Alderman Brian Borchardt as mayor. The new appointee will serve the remainder of his aldermanic current term expiring April 20, 2027.

The minimum requirements are for the alderperson to be at least 18 years of age, a resident of the second district, the ability to attend weekly evening meetings and must be available to give a brief presentation June 3 at the common council meeting.

Interested residents from the second district should complete the Application

for Appointment and return it to the Clerk's Office in City Hall.

Applications can be completed online or be picked up in person from the Clerk's Office.

Applications must be received by noon May 29 to be considered.

Selected applicants will be required to attend the June 3 common council meeting at 6 p.m. to provide a brief presentation to the council highlighting their qualifications and interests in this role. The council will evaluate the presentations and vote; after which, an appointment will be made, the appointee will be sworn in by the Clerk and the appointee will attend the remainder of the meeting as a voting council member.

# Town residents approve right-of-way property transfer

A right-of-way transfer along Stanford Drive in the Town of Neenah clears the way for three neighboring residents to complete a joint purchase of an adjacent vacant lot.

The transfer was approved by 14 electors April 21 during the town's annual meeting.

The annual meeting, which was held at Town Hall, is the one occasion each

year when town electors – registered voters attending in person – make decisions the town board cannot make on its own. Under Wisconsin law, only electors can authorize the sale of town real property, which made the vote a necessary step for the larger transaction to proceed.

The three buyers are residents who live across Stanford Drive from the vacant lot and are purchasing the parcel jointly. The lot is adjacent to Franzoi Park.

The approved right-of-way transfer cov-

ers a smaller portion of land at the edge of the lot that is currently held by the town and is being folded into the overall sale, so the buyers end up with a single parcel.

Chairman Tom Jankowski from the town's Parks and Trails Committee spoke in support of the transfer, saying the sale would keep the lot from being purchased by a developer. The town will take ownership of the portion of the Stanford Drive right-of-way not included in the neighbors' purchase.

Electors also approved the 2025 annual meeting minutes and the 2025 treasurer's report, witnessed the swearing in of newly elected town officials and heard a presentation on 2025 accomplishments and 2026 goals.

They set the 2027 annual meeting for Tuesday, April 20, following the statutory requirement that Wisconsin town annual meetings be held on the third Tuesday in April. The full meeting minutes, once approved, will be posted at townofneenah.com.

reopening the Communications Arts Center and fieldhouse.

"We wanted to get people back in these facilities but as a county, we're not in the business of running theaters or fieldhouses, so we needed to turn to a third-party organization and WEG was the best option," he said. "They came to us with so much excitement and they had great ideas, including new ones to breathe new life into this facility."

Hintz said the loss of the theater and fieldhouse during the transition from UW-Oshkosh to the county was difficult.

"It was hard losing these community assets, but we're excited to see the theater and fieldhouse reopen while we work toward the long-term future plans for the campus," he said. "Our goal is that these facilities are sustainable."

WEG Director Jason Lipsky said it has been a long road for area organizations who used the campus theater for its per-

formances.

"This theater sets us apart from other areas. It's medium-sized and is just the right size for many of our groups," he said, adding the space is ideal for different events. "The theater facilities are in great shape and still in the early life stages of their life cycle."

The theater facilities were built in 2009 at a cost of \$14 million. UW-Oshkosh left the facilities as is when they left.

Local groups returning to the theater include the Fox Valley Concert Band and Attic Theater.

Lipsky said touring acts will also perform at the theater, including AJ the Animated Illusionist, which is being presented by Lifest, on Monday.

The Attic Theater plans a production of "Decision Height" in June. Melody Buchinger, president of the Attic, said she's "thrilled and excited to be back in this theater again."

Fox Valley Performance Volleyball reached an agreement to utilize the fieldhouse. Owner Jason Wheelock said it was an easy "yes" to taking the space.

"With volleyball, you always need more space," he said, adding the club primarily uses the Champion's Center but that "sometimes you need this medium-sized space where you can do lessons, smaller clinics or camps."

Opening the theater and fieldhouse is an initial step as the county continues to market the entire 43-acre campus.

Hintz said the county continues to show the entire property to different groups and having the theater and fieldhouse open will be helpful.

"We want viable programming here, so it doesn't rely on tax dollars. The reality is that the county may have to make tough choices if it doesn't get private investment," he said. "Opening this space will make the rest of campus more attractive to further development."

Ideally, the county would like to see some private development on the property to add to the county's tax base, whether it is housing or businesses, Hintz said.

"We want the campus to be value-added to the community something education-related or related to job training,"

he said.

At Tuesday's County Board of Supervisors meeting, Hintz said April's heavy rains led to some flooding in the mechanical area of the basement, putting some equipment out of service on the campus. A new water heater was purchased to provide hot water to the planetarium, but otherwise current operations were not affected.

Faith Technologies will conduct a damage assessment. Any damage should be covered by insurance, Hintz said.

# Neenah's tradition in tennis special to Lawatsch

Lawatsch held down the No. 2 singles position for much of his sophomore season and advanced to the WIAA individual state tournament that season.

He lost his first-round match that trip, but being able to make it as an individual was a measure of pride.

"The bus rides down to the tournaments

Lawatsch appreciates the Rockets rugged schedule over racking up a bunch of easy wins against lesser programs.
